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History

The Black church was one of the few stable and coherent institutions to emerge from slavery. The “church” became our school, forum, political arena and social club.

Education of the total man (spirit, soul, and body) has always been a priority at Broadway Baptist Church. Shortly after its beginning; the Broadway Baptist Church School was opened with grades one through eleven. The church school continued to serve the community until approximately 1930.

On January 17, 1999, the Broadway Baptist Church installed Dr. C. William Joyner Jr., as Pastor. Shortly after his installation, Dr. Joyner introduced God’s plan for Broadway through the implementation of the vision given to him from God. This vision included the construction of a new sanctuary and Family Life Center, development of the South Augusta CDC, formation of a Pastors’ Alliance and the vision of an educational institution from daycare through college.

The vision of BBC Educational Institution had its beginning as a higher learning institute in September of 1999 when Broadway became a satellite of International Seminary. In September 2004 BBC offered classes through Calvary Bible Institute. In January of 2004 Broadway began the tedious task of becoming Broadway Theological Seminary and on October 31, 2007 we received permission from the Georgia Nonpublic Post-secondary Education Commission to grant degrees as Broadway Theological Seminary in the areas of Religious Education, Theology and Biblical Studies. On December 11, 2007 we were accepted as a candidate for membership and accreditation in the Accrediting Commission International. We are moving forward in faith that we will be receiving full accreditation no later than September of 2008.

Visiting the Campus

Prospective students are encouraged to visit the campus. Visits may be coordinated with the Admissions Office. Prospective students may visit classes, confer with faculty members, and discuss seminary life with students already in the program.

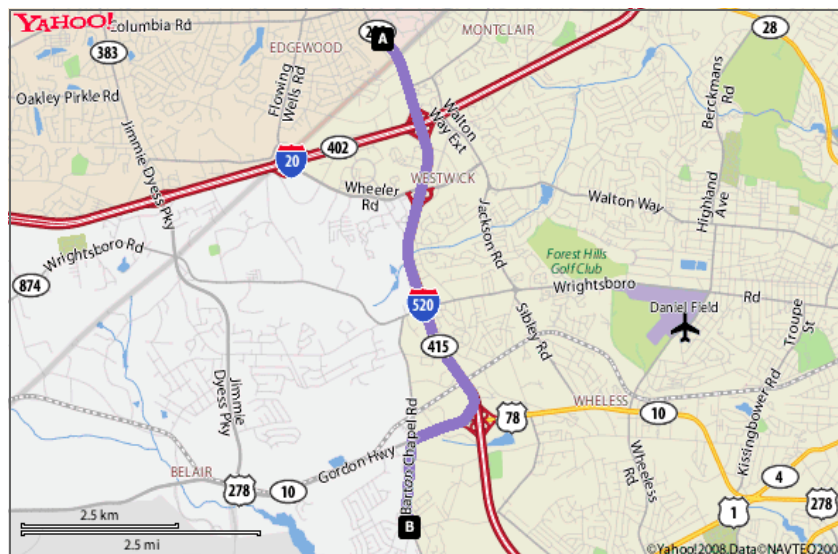

Mission

The mission of Broadway Theological Seminary is to glorify God by providing a biblically based educational curriculum that empowers students to impact the lives of God's people in their communities and the world according to His plan.

Purpose

- To equip students through biblical instructions to fulfill the “Great Commission” as stated in Matthew 28:19-20.
- To incorporate outreach opportunities for young men and women to achieve life skills through biblical instructions that will produce godly ways of thinking to affect behavioral changes.
- Educate persons for service in the Christian church. Broadway Theological Seminary provides ongoing resources for the life and work of the Church.

Values and Goals

Broadway Theological Seminary values and affirms “the Scripture of the Old and New Testaments to be the written Word of God, the only perfect rule of faith and practice.” We seek to be faithful to the Bible, examining the Scriptures in the original languages, interpreting the text faithfully, and applying the teachings of Scripture to those within and without the Church.

Articles of Faith

- ***We believe*** that the Bible is the divinely inspired, infallible and authoritative Word of God, the revelation of His mind and will to man.
- ***We believe*** that there is only one true and living God (Exodus 20:23) who exists as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and that He is worthy of all honor, praise and glory as the creator, sustainer and beginning and end of all things (Rev. 4:11, 5:9-10; Isaiah 43:1,7,21).
- ***We believe*** that Jesus Christ is the Word who became flesh and dwelt among us as the physical manifestation of the Godhead to mankind. We believe in His virgin birth, sinless life, miracles, vicarious and atoning death through His shed blood and His bodily resurrection.
- ***We believe*** the Holy Spirit is the agent of conviction; regeneration, indwelling, baptism, sanctification, and illumination of all are born into God's family through Jesus Christ.
- ***We believe*** that God created the universe in six literal days and that man was created in the image of God but chose to sin. Therefore, all persons inherit a corrupt nature and are lost sinners in need of salvation.
- ***We believe*** that salvation is a free gift of God that is accepted through faith that provides eternal life.
- ***We believe*** in the resurrection of both the saved and the lost: those that are saved unto the resurrection of eternal life in heaven and those that are lost unto the resurrection of eternal damnation in a literal lake of fire.
- ***We believe*** that the local church has been ordained as the spiritual unit of the body of Christ to perpetuate God's truth and work in the world. Believers should be baptized by immersion and should regularly observe the Lord's Supper.
- ***We believe*** in the imminent, pre-Tribulation return of Jesus Christ for all believers. The Rapture of the saints will be followed by a seven year period of Tribulation, after which Christ will return in glory to judge the world and set up his millennial reign on earth.

Objectives

Broadway Theological Seminary values its relationship with other denominations and respects their doctrinal stance in the preparation of candidates for ministry by:

- A. Recognizing that our common ground is more fundamental than our differences. To this end, BTS provides a common curriculum with a balanced approach to ministry, including the traditional emphasis on the Bible, Theology, Christian education, ministerial functions, and Biblical Counseling.
- B. Ensuring the presence of other viewpoints, experiences, and gifts which result in theological and ethnic diversity that broadens the experience of faculty and students.
 - 1. To educate students to be responsible, mature, open, honest, caring and flexible.
 - 2. To develop students who think, write, and speak well.
 - 3. To educate students to regard ministry in the context of the Church, whose particular mission is to follow, bear witness to, worship, and serve Jesus Christ.
 - 4. To teach students to design and implement a program of Christian Education, including the ability to teach and train teachers.
 - 5. To encourage students to stay current on contemporary issues and on trends in the various theological disciplines.
 - 6. To teach students to preach Biblical sermons that communicate effectively the Christian faith and to relate that faith to the changing social structures of our modern world.

BBC Theological Seminary values theological education as a process that results in the growth of the whole person in the context of the community by:

- A. Shaping the Christian character and fostering the spiritual formation of students.
- B. Creating a climate which is intentionally collegial in spirit, characterized by close relationships, small classes, and access to faculty.
- C. To provide the necessary resources and staff to support learning that promotes positive life changing ministries to influence the kingdom building throughout the community and the world.

- D. To network with community resources to cultivate in students a vision of God's redemptive work throughout the world and formulate strategies that will direct them into effective missions, evangelism, discipleship, and citizenship.

Policies for Degree Programs

Application Procedure

The following are required of applicants seeking admission to Broadway Theological Seminary:

1. An application form.
2. Official high school or GED, and college transcripts.
3. Three letters of reference evaluating the applicant's character and potential to engage in ministry
4. Two page essay stating why you would like to pursue a seminary degree payment of a \$25.00 nonrefundable application fee.

Office of Student Affairs

Admissions

Applicants should be devoted to diligently studying the Word of God with the intent to apply the biblical truths to holy living and serving to glorify God. The basic criteria for selection of students include the following:

1. Satisfactory evidence of a Christian commitment to the will of God.
2. Evidence of the ability to meet the academic requirements of Broadway Theological Seminary.
 - A.) A minimum high school or post-secondary grade point average of 2.0
 - B.) Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of 700 or American College Test (ACT) of 17 (for degree seeking candidates only).
 - Provisional admission may be granted in cases where significant time and/or life transformation has occurred since the student's academic record was established. Students who are 26 years of age or older are not required to take SAT or ACT exams

3. Graduation from an accredited secondary school or a certification of high school equivalency or a G.E.D. certificate.
4. Applicant may request a copy of our policy by writing the Admissions Office at P.O. Box 5057, Augusta, Georgia 30916, or calling (706) 790-8185.
5. Race, nationality, ethnic origin, sex, or handicaps are not factors in our selection process. However, at this time we are not equipped with adequate facilities to handle the profound handicap.

8. **Transfer Credits** – The official transcript evaluation of previous college credits will be completed by the Registrar after the student has been accepted. Credits may be received for those students who are transferring credits (major or elective) of course work performed at 2.0 or better. Credits earned at other accredited or recognized Bible colleges or universities at a C or better may be transferred toward student's program of study at Broadway Theological Seminary. Courses must be parallel or equivalent may be received as elective credits up to the limit of electives for the particular program in which the student enrolls at Broadway Theological Seminary.
9. **Reference** – Three letters of recommendation from individuals who have knowledge of applicant's spiritual development and commitment and academic abilities is requested (pastor, other professional, friend, etc.)

10. **Placement/Proficiency Testing** – All students who have not attended colleges beyond high school are required to take proficiency examinations in English. All students are required to take pre-examinations in Bible/Theology. A post examination will be given at the completion of their program.
11. **Pre-registration** — Pre-registration packets will be mailed to all students (those currently enrolled and those who are newly accepted) prior to the official registration period. The pre-registration for subsequent semesters will take place prior to the end of the current semester.
12. **Registration** – All students must finalize their registration by completing the registration and paying the necessary fees.

Acceptance

Processing of applications cannot be completed until the Admissions Office has received all necessary documentation. Applicants accepted will be notified in writing within a reasonable time period after all forms have been received and reviewed.

Provisional Acceptance

Students who do not meet minimum qualifications for acceptance may be accepted on a provisional basis for one semester. These students may take up to nine (9) credit hours, and must also maintain at least a 2.0 for all course work.

Academic Probation

Students who do not maintain the minimum academic requirement GPA of at least (2.0) will be placed on academic probation for one semester. To be removed from probationary status students must perform at a grade of at least 2.5.

Academic Advising

All students enrolled at Broadway Theological Seminary will be assigned an academic advisor. The academic advisor will aid and assist the students through their program of study in an organized fashion in order to alleviate registration and other conflicts. Furthermore, the academic advisor will serve as a spiritual counselor to students as long as their enrollment is validated. Hours for advisement and names of advisors will be posted on the door of the Administration Office.

Bookstore

A campus bookstore is located at BTS. Students may purchase their course textbooks and other supplies such as Bibles, novelties, Christian music cassettes and videos, sermons, etc. T-shirts, sweat-shirts, jackets and other items are also available. Students may make purchases using cash, Visa, or MasterCard.

Computer Lab

BBCTS is in the process of equipping the computer lab to accommodate up to 7 students simultaneously. As enrollment increases other lab equipment will be added.

Registration

Entering students will register for courses during the orientation period. Prior to registration, students will receive instructions on the registration process and guidance concerning courses and particular programs of study.

Course Withdrawal

If it is necessary for students to drop a course after classes have begun, the necessary procedures must be followed. An Add/Drop form must be obtained from the Office of the Registrar, and authorization must be obtained from the advisor. Students dropping a course beyond the course withdrawal dates are subject to receive a drop with failure (WF). Refunds are not given beyond the dates indicated (see policy on withdrawal from Seminary).

Classification of Students

Non-Degree Seeking

Students who are taking courses but are not working toward a particular degree may later transfer credits earned to a certificate or degree program.

Full-time:

A student registered for twelve or more semester hours.

Part-time:

A student registered for eleven or fewer semester hours.

Freshman:

A student who has earned less than 32 hours.

Sophomore:

A student who has completed 32 to 54 semester hours who wishes to earn the Associate degree must have completed 62 hours with a grade point average of 2.0 or better.

Junior:

A student who has been accepted into the Degree program and who has completed 55 to 84 semester hours.

Senior:

A student who has completed at least 85 semester hours, has a grade point average of at least 2.0, and is making satisfactory progress toward meeting all graduation requirements.

Incomplete Work

All work required in a course is due by the end of the term. Incomplete (I) grades is given when emergencies or physical difficulties prevent students from completing their work. All coursework incomplete at the end of the term may be made up only at the discretion of the professor and in accordance with his or her instructions. A grade penalty may be assessed though the student is allowed to make up the work. Any grade of “I” (Incomplete) must be removed within three months.

Scholastic Honors

Students receiving exceptional grades will be awarded scholastic honors based upon their performance.

Summa cum laude (with greatest distinction) for grade point ratio of 3.80 and above.

Magna cum laude (with great distinction) for grade point ratio of 3.60 to 3.79.

Cum laude (with distinction) for grade point ratio of 3.40 to 3.59.

Grade Reports

All grades are permanently recorded on the student’s academic transcripts and become a part of their scholastic record. An unsatisfactory grade (“D” or “F”) in a course must remain on the transcript and is used in calculation of the students’ grade point ratio. However, if student repeats a course, the new grade replaces the unsatisfactory grade for GPR calculations, both grades remain a permanent part of the student’s transcript.

Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend all classes. In general, students must not be absent from a class more than the equivalent of a set number of class periods as specified in the course syllabus. Consult the syllabus for each course for guidance on the attendance policy of the faculty member. It is the responsibility of each student to meet with the respective faculty member to discuss absences and to schedule make-up work if such is to be allowed.

If a student is representing the college in an official capacity, as verified on a list released from the Dean, the student will not be penalized by the instructor for those absences, and the student will be allowed to make up the work missed; such absences, as all others, are recorded and apply toward the maximum number of absences tolerated per term.

Absence from Examinations

No student who fails to take a final examination when scheduled may take the examination without written permission of the instructor/Division Chair or Dean. Exceptions are approved only for emergency situations or personal hardships. Completion of the final examination is required for successful completion of the course.

Bachelor of Religious Education

- HIS101** Church History- A short intense view of the church's struggle through the ages until modern missionary times. It discusses the excesses that caused the reformation and denominations: the years of persecution and years of great sacrifice.
- PSY102** Search for Significance- An excellent study of our inner-selves and how to excel to where God desires us to be.
- SOC103** Basic Sociology- An introduction to the sociological perspective and the social strata pointing out the importance of the Christian's ability to relate to others in the global community in which we live.
- THE104** Christian Character- This course deals with the uniqueness of a life truly committed to Christ. It answers such questions as, how does a Christian behave, what is the character of a Christian, and creates a desire to live a life pleasing to the Lord.
- ENG105** English Grammar and Composition- This course provides a detailed study of the grammatical structure of the English language and a thorough teaching of how to write clear and graceful prose.
- BIR106** Life of Christ- A study of Jesus Christ, his early years, His ministry, crucifixion, death, resurrection, and ascension.
- BIB107** Old Testament Survey- A study of the thirty-nine books of the Old Testament. Emphasis is placed on major characters and events of the book and the passages of doctrinal significance.
- BIB108** New Testament Survey- A study of the New with emphasis on the themes of the New Testament, the writers, the divisions of the New Testament and insight into the Pauline Epistles.
- THE109** Witnessing In Our Age- An important study on why witnessing is needed, who is to witness and the qualifications. It is also a study of comparative religions, how to deal with agnostics, atheists, backsliders, and much more.
- THE110** Personal Soul Winning- Concepts and personal (one on one) soul winning for fulfilling the Great Commission by reaching those around you.
- SPC201** Speech/Public Speaking- This course covers basic principles of public speaking from a Christian perspective. Students will learn how to find, develop, support, focus, and develop the ideas for your speech/sermon; how to effectively deliver your remarks; and how to prepare a biblical message.
- SOC202** Christian Marriage and the Family- A study of how God ordained the establishment of marriage with orderly principles, which will enable the family to face problems, resolve conflicts, and meet each other's emotional needs.

- HIS207** Church Music in Worship and Contemporary Culture- This study provides some of the aspects of music in worship, a Biblical and historical basis for problem solving, and a review of current contemporary cultural issues in music and worship.
- BIB210** Prophets- A study of the major and minor prophets concentrating on the social, political, and religious conditions of their time. Special emphasis will be placed on the Messianic and Millennial prophecies.
- BIB212** General Epistles- A survey of the Epistles of the New Testament covers the thrust and instruction for pastors and laymen and points to the application for the day.
- BIB215** New Testament Project: Ministry Development- Students are expected to complete individual/collaborative assignments and projects that relate specifically to the New Testament.
- THE220** Christian Ethics- An introduction to ethics. The objective of this course is to provide a method for bringing biblically-based Christian convictions to bear on current moral problems which face the Church at both the individual and communal levels. In particular, we shall consider issues relating to family and sexuality, war and self-defense, poverty and wealth, racism and social justice.
- THE222** Theology of Praise and Worship- The student will explore the theology behind the heart of praise and worship, and becoming a worshiper.
- THE230** Effective Preaching Methods- This course covers the content of the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the various methods and models of challenging and inviting unbelievers to salvation, and the effective techniques of past and present evangelists. The relationship between music and altar call, as well as guidelines for reaching children and youths with the Gospel will also be covered.
- CED300** Preschool/Childhood Christian Education- This course is a study of the church's educational program for children, birth-11 years old. Spiritual, physical, psychological and educational maturation principles will be examined. Aims, methods, materials, evaluation, and program of ministry to children will be studied.
- CED301** Adolescent Christian Education- This course is a study of the church's educational program for Youth 12-17 years old. Spiritual physical, psychological, and educational maturation will be examined. Aims, methods, materials, evaluation, and program of ministry for youth will be studied.
- CED302** Adult Christian Education- The unique characteristics of the stages of young, middle and senior adults will be studied in the content of implications for adult religious programming. Electives will be given to special categories of adults such as: married, single, and widowed. Objectives, methodologies, administration and emotional concerns will be considered.
- PSY301** Psychology and Counseling- This course is an introduction to the distinctive ministry of Christian counseling and psychological theories, techniques, strategies, and models that can be implemented in the Christian Education program based on biblical teachings.

- THE301** **Hermeneutics-** A study of the science and art of Biblical interpretation. This course will develop legitimate means and valid principles for an honest interpretation of Scripture through the study of the nature of Scripture, the history of interpretation, presuppositions and applied methods, usually called exegesis.
- BIB305** **Pentateuch-** Emphasis of this course is biblical theology. Introduces the student to the theology of the Pentateuch, emphasizing its foundational relevance for understanding the whole the Bible. Attention will be given to the historical context, literary structure, and contents of each book. Includes such topics the nature of the canon as a covenant document, the logic of Israel's sacrificial system, the relevance of Old Testament law for Christians, etc.
- BIB307** **Covenants-** A study of the covenants God made with man and how they affect our lives today.
- CED310** **History of Christian Education-** A survey of the history of Christian education including Old Testament, New Testament, and contemporary teaching that have shaped and impacted education in the church.
- ADM312** **Managing Church Resources-** A study of basic bookkeeping and accounting principles, business practices, and records which are necessary for the proper function of the overall church inclusive of an educational facility.
- THE312** **Theology of Christian Education-** A comprehensive survey of the biblical principles justifying the need and practice of Christian education. Historical roots are traced from the earliest commands of God to the people of Israel to the present day methods employed in religious education.
- ADM400** **Effective Leadership in Christian Education-** This course is designed to increase the student's knowledge of the theoretical aspects of leadership and of administrative roles within the Church. Secular and Christian ideas of administrative roles within the Church. Secular and Christian ideas of leadership are examined and applied to Christian education in the local church.
- CED400** **Teaching Methods-** A practical course explaining and utilizing various teaching methods that can be used in the classroom, to equip students to communicate their ideas and subject matter in a clear, concise and effective manner.
- CED403** **Curriculum Development-** A study of curriculum theory and principles emphasizing the preparation, evaluation and selection of instructional materials for the educational ministries of the church and school.
- ADM405** **Ministry Assessment-** An in-depth study of constructive assessment that will strengthen and build up the body of Christ. The methods of assessing and identifying strengths on which to build and weaknesses on which to work in your specific congregation will be addresses. Systematically sound methods of gathering information from a variety of sources to determine the extend of which the body of believers are experiencing Bible based instruction for the building of the Kingdom of God.

- CED405** **Contemporary Issues in Christian Education-** A study of contemporary issues in Christian education, including biblical, theological, philosophical, historical, sociological, psychological, and curricular issues.
- THE405** **Basic Apologetics-** A study of the defense of faith, particularly from the standpoint of the authority of the Bible and historical evidences of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.
- CED412** **Christian Education and Church Growth-** A survey of the theological, sociological, and statistical dimensions of the church movement as they relate to Christian education.
- CED415** **Leviticus-** This course consists of an exegetical treatment of the book including discussion of its form, structure, and setting. Recent anthropological theories are considered in as much as they provide insight into the nature of Israel's purity laws. Additional topics include sacrifice in the ancient Near East, the theology of sacrifices in the Old Testament, the nature and meaning of holiness, and the relevance of Leviticus for Christians today.
- LAG415** **Basic Greek-** This course is a further study of Greek grammar, vocabulary, and syntax. It is designed to acquaint the student with the essentials of New Testament Greek by developing a working knowledge of the form and function of case, tense, voice, and mood.
- CED420** **Evangelism, Discipleship and Mentoring-** A study of the Biblical injunctions to evangelize with emphasis on developing the skills of personal evangelism, discipleship and mentoring.

Bachelor in Theology

- HIS101** **Church History-** A short intense view of the church's struggle through the ages until modern missionary times. It discusses the excesses that caused the reformation and denominations: the years of persecution and years of great sacrifice.
- PSY102** **Search for Significance-** An excellent study of our inner-selves and how to excel to where God desires us to be.
- SOC103** **Basic Sociology-** An introduction to the sociological perspective and the social strata pointing out the importance of the Christian's ability to relate to others in the global community in which we live.
- THE104** **Christian Character-** This course deals with the uniqueness of a life truly committed to Christ. It answers such questions as, how does a Christian behave, what is the character of a Christian, and creates a desire to live a life pleasing to the Lord.
- ENG105** **English Grammar and Composition-** This course thoroughly reviews traditional grammar and mechanics. It introduces the writing process and requires the writing of paragraphs, descriptions, essays, and autobiography. Along with the writing is special work on sentence improvement and appropriate use of words.

- BIR106** **Life of Christ-** A study of Jesus Christ, his early years, His ministry, crucifixion, death, resurrection, and ascension.
- BIB107** **Old Testament Survey-** A study of the thirty-nine books of the Old Testament. Emphasis is placed on major characters and events of the book and the passages of doctrinal significance.
- BIB108** **New Testament Survey-** A study of the New Testament with emphasis on the themes of the New Testament, the writers, the divisions of the New Testament and insight into to Pauline Epistles.
- THE109** **Witnessing In Our Age-** An important study on why witnessing is needed, who is to witness and the qualifications. It is also a study of comparative religions, how to deal with agnostics, atheists, backsliders, and much more.
- THE110** **Personal Soul Winning-** Concepts and personal (one on one) soul winning for fulfilling the Great Commission by reaching those around you.
- SPC201** **Speech/Public Speaking-** This course covers basic principles of public speaking from a Christian perspective. Students will learn how to find, develop, support, focus and develop the ideas for your speech/sermon; how to effectively deliver your remarks; and how to prepare a biblical message.
- SOC202** **Christian Marriage and the Family-** A study of how God ordained the establishment of marriage with orderly principles, which will enable the family to face problems, resolve conflicts, and meet each other's emotional needs.
- HIS207** **Church Music in Worship and Contemporary Culture-** This study provides some of the aspects of music in worship, a Biblical and historical basis for problem solving, and a review of current contemporary cultural issues in music and worship.
- BIB210** **Prophets-** A study of the major and minor prophets concentrating on the social, political, and religious conditions of their time. Special emphasis will be placed on the Messianic and Millennial prophecies.
- BIB212** **General Epistles-** A survey of the Epistles of the New Testament covers the thrust and instruction for pastors and laymen and points to the application for the day.
- BIB215** **New Testament Project: Ministry Development-** Students are expected to complete individual/collaborative assignments and projects that relate specifically to the New Testament.
- THE220** **Christians Ethics-** An introduction to ethics. The objective of this course is to provide a method for bringing biblically-based Christian convictions to bear on current moral problems which face the Church at both the individual and communal levels. In particular, we shall consider issues relating to family and sexuality, war and self-defense, poverty and wealth, racism and social justice.
- THE222** **Theology of Praise and Worship-** The student will explore the theology behind the heart of praise and worship, and becoming a worshiper.

- THE230** **Effective Preaching Methods-** This course covers the content of the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the various methods and models of challenging and inviting unbelievers to salvation, and the effective techniques of past and present evangelists. The relationship between music and altar call, as well as guidelines for reaching children and youths with the Gospel will also be covered.
- THE300** **Pentateuch-** Emphasis of this course is biblical theology. Introduces the student to the theology of the Pentateuch, emphasizing its foundational relevance for understanding the whole of the Bible. Attention will be given to the historical context, literary structure, and contents of each book. Includes such topics the nature of the canon as a covenant document, the logic of Israel's sacrificial system, the relevance of Old Testament law for Christians, etc.
- THE301** **Hermeneutics-** A study of the science and art of Biblical interpretation. This course will develop legitimate means and valid principles for an honest interpretation of Scripture through the study of the nature of Scripture, the history of interpretation, presuppositions and applied methods, usually called exegesis.
- BIB301** **Biblical Prophecy-** A study of the main themes in the prophetic literature with special interest in eschatological patterns and themes.
- BIB303** **The Gospel of John-** An in-depth study of the life of Jesus Christ as portrayed by the beloved disciple. Students will study the seven signs John gives proving the divinity of Christ. The life of abiding in spiritual awareness will be examined.
- THE304** **Systematic Theology-** A course introducing the different components of theology and theological language in preparation for in-dept study of individual theologies within the discipline.
- THE306** **Homiletics-** An introduction to the spiritual and practical techniques of sermon preparation and delivery.
- BIB307** **Covenants-** A study of the covenants God made with man and how they affect our lives today.
- THE310** **Sermon Outline and Development-** An introduction to the basic methods and principles of preparing relevant biblical sermons.
- ADM312** **Managing Church Resources-** A study of basic bookkeeping and accounting principles, business practices, and records which are necessary for the proper function of a church facility and ministries.
- LAG315** **Basic Hebrew-** An analysis of elementary Hebrew including alphabet, vowels, nouns, particles, adjectives and other parts of speech.
- BIB401** **Epistles-** A study of the proper use of New Testament Epistles in the original for the purpose of responsible and effective teaching and preaching.
- THE401** **Bible Communication I-** A study of how God communicates with man, explaining the origin of the Bible, its development, its various literary forms (including figurative language and speech) and sound rules for proper interpretation.

- THE402** **Bible Communication II-** An advanced study of how God communicates with man, explaining the origin of the Bible, its development, its various literary forms (including figurative language and speech) and sound rules for proper interpretation.
- BIB403** **Acts of Apostles-** A study of the lives and times of the apostles, revealing the beginning of the church, its witnesses and its progress. Included are the Apostle's Paul's three missionary journeys and his trip to Rome.
- THE403** **Great Doctrines-** A study of God, Christ, the Holy Spirit, man, the church, salvation, redemption, sanctification and prayer.
- THE405** **Basic Apologetics-** A study of the defense of faith, particularly from the standpoint of the authority of the Bible and historical evidences of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.
- BIB405** **Romans-** An exposition of Romans noting man's condemnation because of sin and his justification and sanctification because of the work of Christ.
- BIB407** **Revelation-** A careful study of the content and message of this book of prophecy. Current economic, political, and social trends are noted as they point toward the rapidly approaching fulfillment of the prophecy of Revelation.
- ADM412** **Church Organization and Administration-** Explores the foundation for purposeful administration with emphasis on principles and practices of management and administration designed for the particular needs of non-profit organization.
- LAG415** **Basic Greek-** This course is a concentrated study of Greek grammar, vocabulary, and syntax. It is designed to acquaint the student with the essentials of New Testament Greek by developing a working knowledge of the form and function of case, tense, voice, and mood.

Biblical Studies

- HIS101** **Church History-** A short intense view of the church's struggle through the ages until Modern missionary times. It discusses the excesses that caused the reformation and denominations: the years of persecution and years of great sacrifice.
- PSY102** **Search for Significance-** An excellent study of our inner-selves and how to excel to where God desires us to be.
- PTH104** **Church Government-** An overview of historical church government with particular emphasis on the early Church and government by consensus.
- ENG105** **English Grammar and Composition-** This course provides a detailed study of the grammatical structure of the English language and a thorough teaching of how to write clear and graceful prose.

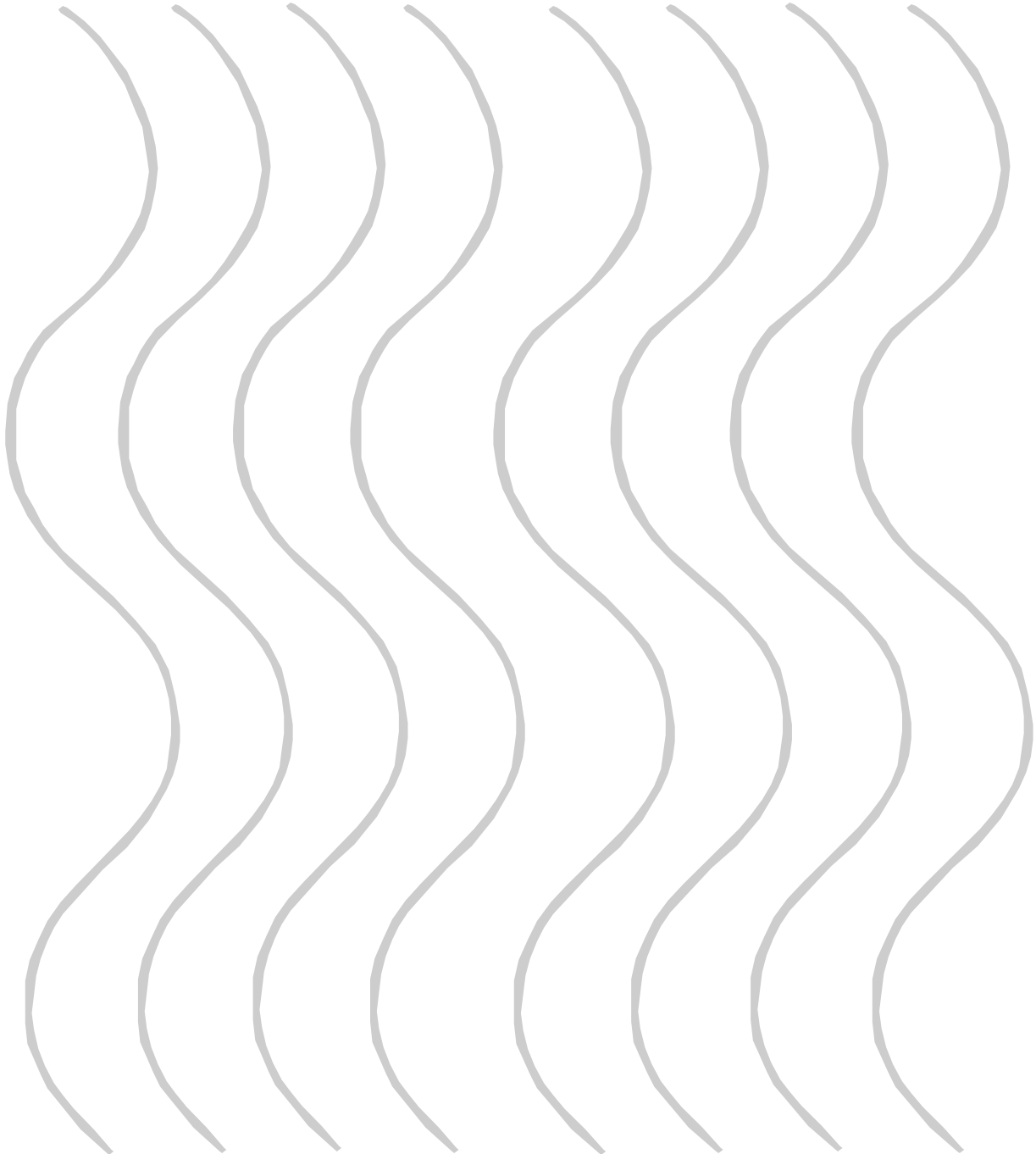
- BIB107** **Old Testament Survey-** A study of the thirty-nine books of the Old Testament. Emphasis is placed on major characters and events of the book and the passages of doctrinal significance.
- BIB108** **New Testament Survey-** A study of the New Testament with emphasis on the themes of the New Testament, the writers, the divisions of the New Testament and insight into to Pauline Epistles.
- NTS110** **Gospels: Life of Christ-** This chronological study will be informative, inspirational, and practical. The course will relate the parallel accounts in the four Gospels, and divide the life and ministry of Christ into generally accepted periods. Through proper study and research, the student will have a thorough understanding of Jesus' example of ministry in the power of the Holy Spirit.
- PTH111** **Principles of Bible Study-** Various methods of bible study are introduced in this course to prepare the student for an exciting lifetime of Bible investigation for personal growth and teaching opportunities. Methods include: word studies, biographical studies, historical studies and more.
- THE161** **Christian Foundations-** This course is designed to provide the student with the elementary principles of the Christian faith. Basic principles of Bible study, prayer, ordinances of the Church, etc., are surveyed.
- THE162** **Theology of Worship-** A practical application in the development of a music and worship program. Special emphasis is given to the Biblical basis for worship in the church today. Modes and concepts of worship are examined.
- NTS202** **Acts: Mandate for Missions-** A thorough study of the content of the book of Acts with emphasis on the work of the Holy Spirit in the origin and growth of the early Church. The journeys of Paul are studied relationship with his epistles.
- SYS210** **Bible Doctrines-** A major study of the Bible in a systematic way. The principle doctrines of the Scripture will be outlined and each discussed in a step-by-step process. This course is the base upon which the student will build theological foundation.
- NTS211** **Romans: The Overcoming Life-** A practical study of Paul's letter to the Romans dealing with the background of the book and its relation to the rest of the Pauline writings. Attention is given to understanding theological terms and concepts as "flesh," "Spirit," and "law" in the epistle.
- NTS212** **First and Second Corinthians-** A course study of the Corinthian letters including exegesis and offering possible solutions for each major problem dealt with by the Apostle Paul. Offers interpretations which can be applied to the twentieth century Church.
- OTS220** **Historical Books-** The study of the Old Testament books from Joshua to Esther who deals with the nation of Israel in its rise, disruption, fall, captivity, and restoration. Special emphasis given to the background for the further study of the prophecies.

- OTS221** **Joshua-** An in-depth study of the book of Joshua covering such topics as the conquest of Canaan, the establishment of Israel in Canaan, the morals of war and other theological issues associated with this fast paced book.
- OTS222** **Nehemiah-** An analysis of the narrative giving attention to the principles of leadership as effected through the life of Nehemiah. The combination of spirituality and practicality, prayer and perseverance are critical elements of this study.
- SYS222** **Christology-** A comprehensive study of what the Scriptures say about Jesus Christ. The course introduces the student to Old Testament typology and to the prophecies concerning Christ's present and future work. Controversial historical and contemporary views of Jesus are examined in relation to the Bible portrayal.
- THE241** **Authority of the Believer-** The student is led through a study of what makes victorious living possible. The course will demonstrate how God has given us all that we need to live victoriously and challenges us to grab hold of what we already possess. Gaining or regaining the necessary momentum to sustain a lifelong drive toward consistent triumph is made a reality.
- THE250** **Faith Principles in Action-** This course introduces examples and testimonies of people of faith and how the spiritual disciplines were applied during times of victory and struggle as an effective witness for Christ.
- THE300** **Comparative Religions-** A comparative study of the main world religious systems as related to the Biblical principles of Christianity. Modern cults are also addressed and major points in witnessing to adherents of non-Christian religions are discussed.
- THE301** **Hermeneutics-** A study of the science and art of Biblical interpretation. This course will develop legitimate means and valid principles for an honest interpretation of Scripture through the study of the nature of Scripture, the history of interpretation, presuppositions and applied methods, usually called exegesis.
- PTH301** **Leadership Principles-** This course is designed to increase the student's knowledge of the theoretical aspects of leadership and of administrative roles within the Church. Secular and Christian ideas of leadership are examined and applied to Christian education in the local church.
- PTH302** **Principles of Administration and Organization-** The foundation for purposeful administration are explored with emphasis on a model which begins with accurately recognizing needs and the subsequent steps necessary to implement plans addressing the needs and the effective methods for evaluating plans, personnel and results.
- THE303** **The Tabernacle of David-** This study examines Davidic worship, its expression, and importance for the church today with practical applications for the individual student.
- PTH306** **Christian Ethics-** A study of Christian ethics for the everyday life with sound Biblical principles and practical applications for the professional and problem aspects encountered in the ministry.

- LAG315** **Basic Hebrew-** An analysis of elementary Hebrew including alphabet, vowels, nouns, particles, adjectives and other parts of speech.
- SYS321** **Pneumatology-** The Person and Work of the Holy Spirit: A scriptural and practical presentation of the nature, personality, gifts, and fruit of the Holy Spirit. Students will learn how to practically assess, value, and function in the gifts. This class will involve academic, as well as practical training.
- NTS330** **General Epistles-** An exegetical study of First and Second Peter, First, Second, and Third John, James and Jude. Authorship, themes, outlines and discussion of the issues raised in these epistles will be studied.
- OTS330** **Poetic Books-** Selected portions of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon are studied with respect to divine inspiration and practical teaching.
- THE400** **Identifying Your Spiritual Gift-** This course is designed to assist the student in discovering their calling in the ministry through the discovery of their God-given gifts. Also included is how to impart personal involvement in the local church by discovering, developing, and deploying the spiritual gift, and how to understand our part in the Great Commission.
- THE401** **Bible Communication I-** A study of how God communicates with man, explaining the origin of the Bible, its development, its various literary forms (including figurative language and speech) and sound rules for proper interpretation.
- THE402** **Bible Communication II-** An advanced study of how God communicates with man, explaining the origin of the Bible, its development, its various literary forms (including figurative language and speech) and sound rules for proper interpretation.
- THE405** **Basic Apologetics-** A study of the defense of faith, particularly from the standpoint of the authority of the Bible and historical evidences of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.
- NTS406** **John's Epistle-** The epistle of John are studied, giving careful attention to the unique theological nuances of the Apostle John. Instructions aimed at the individual believer and the general church is given specific attention to enhance spiritual growth.
- IB407** **Revelation-** A careful study of the content and message of this book of prophecy. Current economic, political, and social trends are noted as they point toward the rapidly approaching fulfillment of the prophecy of Revelation.
- THE408** **Stewardship in the Local Church-** A Biblical framework for the spiritual discipline of stewardship and how to practice and teach it in the local church environment.
- OTS410** **Major Prophets-** An intensive historical, doctrinal, and critical study of the International relations in the days of the prophets as well as the religious, spiritual, and civic decline of Judah during that time. Special emphasis is placed on the Messianic and Millennial prophecies.

LAG415 **Basic Greek-** This course is a concentrated study of Greek grammar, vocabulary, and syntax. It is designed to acquaint the student with the essentials of New Testament Greek by developing a working knowledge of the form and function of case, tense, voice, and mood.

OTS420 **Minor Prophets-** A study of the twelve Minor Prophets, concentrating on the social, political, and religious conditions of their time comparing and contrasting their message and thought with the contemporary thinking of the time. These prophets were spiritual, progressive, analysts, and exponents of their day.
